Getting to Know - The New Head Gardener

We promised to introduce you to the new Head Gardener at Reader Rock Garden, *Daniel Walker*. So, we posed a few questions to him, just to share some insights with us:

Q. Your hometown?

I grew up Millet, AB. It's a very small town of around 1900 people located in central Alberta, Canada. It's the kind of town where everyone knows each other, making it a great place for my parents to raise myself and

three younger brothers. In the summer of 2008, my family moved to an acreage just outside of Wetaskiwin. It was a "huge" move for my family, even though it was only five minutes from Millet. This is where my love for the horticulture world blossomed.

Q. When did you arrive in Calgary?

I moved to Calgary in the summer of 2009, right after college. I felt that the city was calling my name. I love the mountains - who wouldn't want to live in a city when you can see the mountains from your back yard?! I instantly loved the hustle and bustle of the big city, and all the various activities to do, to see and to enjoy.

Q. Favorite book(s) / movie(s)?

I'm kind of all over the map when it comes to favorite books and movies. I like a little bit of everything, depending on my mood. But, I tend to lean towards non-fiction and fantasy to allow my mind to create the world and scenery in the book any way I see fit.

Q. Have a favorite saying or perspective?

I try to live by the motto, "*change is good*." From trying new foods, experiences and meeting new people to even simply taking a different path when walking through the Garden. It helps me gain a new viewpoint or perspective that I may not have noticed if I follow the same route over and over.

Q. Hobbies or non-work related interests?

Obviously, gardening is a passion of mine. I'm always visiting greenhouses and plant exchanges to find hidden treasures. I also love to cook and bake, especially for my friends and family. And, when my schedule allows, I enjoy trying new recipes once or twice a week. Some have been huge successes, while others have been total flops. I think my love for cooking stems back to my childhood and the great memories I have when my whole family came together for family dinners or special occasions.

I'm just starting to get involved in learning yoga and hiking, and am looking forward to doing more of both of these activities now that my busy schedule is a little lighter.

Q. Where & what did you study post-secondary school?

I went to Olds College from 2003-2005, where I studied Ornamental Horticulture and majored in landscape management. Olds helped me realize that I will always be connected to the horticulture industry in some fashion.

Q. Previous work experiences? Horticultural or otherwise?

I've worked at a variety of jobs. Before my college days, I worked at a local greenhouse over the summers carrying soil bags and plants out to customer's vehicles. Later, I moved up the

ladder and began working in the tree lot watering and making sales displays. It was amazing to see all the plants bloom together, and inspired my creativity as I built the displays. For two seasons, I even worked in Custom Order Planters and Hanging Basket department.

I also spent some time working in the oil fields in Fort McMurray, mainly over the winter months. There, I worked in the warehouse in the Shipping and Receiving department, as well as a second year pipefitter. I was very grateful for the work in the oil fields, but it made me appreciate my work at the greenhouse and solidified that working in horticulture is my first love and passion.

Q. Professional affiliations or publications?

I have been involved with the Communities in Bloom competition in both Millet and Wetaskiwin. Millet has won nationally in the competition. I am a current member of the Calgary Horticulture Society, and am looking to get more involved with the Society, as well with Friends of Reader Rock Garden Society (FoRRGS), Calgary Rock and Alpine Garden Society (CRAGS), and the Foothills Orchid Society.

Q. Best thing(s) about *Reader Rock Garden* (RRG)?

The best thing about Reader Rock is the unique location in downtown Calgary. It's so easy to get to by transit or driving, yet the majority of the public don't know of its existence. The plant material in the park is spectacular. There are numerous gems that I'm not completely familiar with, and I pride myself on knowing a lot of plants. I'm challenged daily to do more research, and learn more about the park.

Q. Your cool discoveries at RRG? (historical/flora/fauna/insects/etc.?)

The park is not just home to plants, but to wildlife as well. The diversity of the park is another thing that makes the park so incredible. This year, we were blessed to have a family of ducks, osprey, hawks and a mink that we named *Fred* call the garden their home. I really hope that with the renovations of the beds and addition of new to the garden plant material, the biodiversity of the garden continues to grow.

Q. What would you like the public to know about this special place?

Reader Rock Garden is a very unique and special place. It's one of the oldest gardens in the city, and has a lot of historic value attached to it. We do a lot in the park to preserve its historic side by planting materials William Reader, the Superintendent for Calgary Parks from 1913-1942, trialed for and introduced to Calgary's environment. In 2006, the park was honoured with a Calgary Heritage Authority Lion Award in Landscape Preservation, earning official designation as a Provincial Historic Resource.

Q. All-time favorite plant/tree at RRG or in the plant world?

I absolutely love the *Sorbus aucuparia* (European Mountain Ash) in the high rockery. It clings to the hillside while giving a beautiful fall display over the inner road. I also love the *A esculus hippocastanum* (Horse-Chestnut) with its unique candle-like flower, massive palmate leaves and gorgeous spiky conkers in the fall.

Q. Must-sees highlights onsite?

The spring season, when the hillsides are blue from all the Scilla and Hepatica, is definitely one of the best seasons to walk through the gardens. But, each season has interesting and unique features that everyone will enjoy seeing.

Q. Your future plans for RRG &/or any insider scoop?

In the upcoming year, our focus will be renovating the plant beds in the Garden. It's quite the undertaking because it involves evaluating the existing plant material and planning how to incorporate new material into the bed. For example, if there are large amounts of one species, we will evaluate the appropriateness of removing

some of the species to add in another. The removed species will then be placed either in one of our holding beds, relocated to other park, or made available as a plant sale at the FoRRG's Garden Stroll. Another focus of the renovation, is to help manage perennial weeds, especially the Campanula rapunculoides (creeping bellflower).

We are also looking at developing an onsite herbarium to help educate visitors about the different species that are now considered prohibited noxious plants. Some of these still grow in the Garden but are continuously monitored and kept in check.

Q. Most challenging task(s) at RRG?

Most people would think that the most challenging task at the garden would be weeding. Don't get me wrong, that's a big one. But, I would have to say that the most challenging task is finding all the species that William Reader trialed at the Garden during his time as the Parks Superintendent. The challenge comes in trying to find the cultivators of these species, like the iris, peony, phlox and lilac collection, and then figuring out how to grow them and help them survive Calgary's harsh climate due to the chinooks. The majority of these cultivars are no longer commercially available and have to be procured through specialty growers. Working with other botanic gardens, commercial vendors and private growers in hopes of finding all the species on Reader's list is another big undertaking we'll be focusing on as part of our future work plan.

In Austria I operated bars, restaurants and catering businesses for more than 20 years. Since our arrival in Calgary I worked as F&B Manager for a Casino, Operation manager in a well-known Catering company as well as General manager of an European style bakery.

Q. Best thing(s) about the Café or the Garden?

The best of Reader's Garden Café is its unique atmosphere. This is the result of being a historic building with interesting background stories as well as its very special, almost hidden location in the center of the city, in the middle of this diverse and very well maintained garden.

O. Your cool discoveries at the Café or Garden? (historical/ flora/fauna/insects/etc.???)

The documented, impressive transition from a 'naked' 'anywhere' hill to this beautiful, colorful and interesting site in the City.

Q. What would you like the public to know about this special place?

Dealing with the difficulties of being a seasonal business in general (seasonal set-up and tear-down, staffing, etc.) and also to deal with the dependence on daily weather conditions.

We noticed from the onset, that the vast majority of visitors remark that they never knew about Reader Rock Garden, even though they've resided in Calgary for many years. Better visual communication and signage locations for both the Garden and Café would help to make people aware of this unique park and our Cafe. I am already in talks with the City and suggested two spots for new signage that I think would make a big difference.

Q. Who would you love to have as a guest at the Café?

Everyone! Its a meetup place for anyone who appreciates the gardens and the atmosphere. It is a place for all age groups, from all walks of life...diverse as the gardens

Q. Other things you'd like to share with us?

I really liked the atmosphere of your FoRRGS Annual Stroll event, with the blending of varied interests: horticultural, arts and social interactions. It was a fun-filled day!


